# **Background**

Living Sky School Division (LSKYSD) believes that a sense of identity and heritage, combined with an understanding of deomocratic values and processes are important to the development of students as secure and productive members of society.

# Scope

This procedure applies to all personnel in the Living Sky School Division.

## **Roles & Responsibilities**

All employees of LSKYSD are to work together to model and support identity, heritage and citizenship by:

- fostering students' spiritual, social, physical and intellectual development, making them more self-confident and responsible both in and beyond the classroom.
- encouraging students to become informed, thoughtful and responsible citizens who are aware of their duties and rights and who demonstrate honesty, integrity, compassion and fairness.
- helping students to acquire skills, attitudes, and understandings to participate in society at local, national, and international levels. Students are encouraged to play a helpful part in the life of their schools, communities and the world.
- instilling respect for national, religious and ethnic identities; and develop students' ability to reflect on issues and take part in discussions while respecting differences in opinion.
- ensuring all students know their rights and responsibilities under Treaty Six, and have experience with First Nations and Métis ways of knowing through an understanding of worldview and perspectives.

#### **Procedures**

- 1. Each school will display:
  - a. the Canadian flag and Saskatchewan flag, both outside and inside the school building
  - b. the Treaty 6 flag and Métis flag
  - c. the Treaty 6 Document
  - d. The Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms
  - e. the photograph of the Current Monarch
  - f. the Apology by the Federal Government
- 2. The citizenship exercises observed by a school will be determined by the principal in consultation with the staff and the School Community Council. Such exercises include, but are not limited to:
  - a. the singing or playing of the national anthem
  - b. a Treaty Land Acknowledgement statement. Schools may use a statement from the division website or can craft statements specific to their place and and the purpose of the event.



- c. the annual recognition of Remembrance Day and National Day of Truth and Reconciliation
- 3. In planning to display Treaty symbols (e.g., Treaty medal, Treaty flag, Métis flag), the following will be considered:
  - a. The raising or displaying of Treaty symbols should be surrounded by learning, before, during and after the event. Treaties are sacred.
  - b. Displaying Treaty symbols will inherently include a sense of a commitment to ongoing learning and strong relationships.
  - c. As a Treaty is a symbol of partnership, displaying a Treaty symbol may also include a partnership with a local First Nation neighbor or a First Nation family from within your school/community. Within this partnership, consultation and collaboration about protocols for displaying a Treaty symbol would be appropriate.
- 4. Schools are to allow for the recognition of diverse languages or religious practices in terms of "O Canada" and Remembrance Day.
